10.	<b>Course Content:</b> Complex numbers, geometric representation, stereographic projection, Sequences and series, Power series, Radius of convergence. Elementary functions. Limits, continuity and differentiability, Analytic functions, Cauchy Riemann equations, Taylor Series. Line integral, Cauchy's integral theorem, Cauchy's integral formula, Liouville's theorem, Fundamental Theorem of Algebra, Maximum Modulus Principle and Morera's theorem. Zeros and singularities, Laurent series, Residue theory and its application to integrals, Casorati Weierstrass theorem, Picard's Theorem (without proof), Argument principle, Rouché's theorem and Möbius transformation.
